

PRESTIGE'S STORY

On the night of Guy Fawkes celebration 7th November 2009, my Arab stallion sustained an horrific injury, after being frightened through a post and rail fence and nearly gutting himself. The wound measured approximately 26cm in diameter and had cut the muscles covering his soft tissue that protects his stomach. He was only about 1/4 of an inch away from being put down.

His initial veterinary treatment included trimming a large flap of skin away from the outside of the wound, which was then sprayed with a purple antiseptic spray. He was given a massive dose of antibiotics, a tetanus shot, and painkillers, and had to be confined and kept quiet. He was then transported on the third day to our dairy farm and kept close by so that he could be monitored.

On the 22nd November 2009 we started to apply TuffRock. I was and still am amazed at the results that occurred. The healing that went on in such a short time was fantastic. Although the Injury occurred on the 7th, and it was a while before the TuffRock Non-Medicated Poultice was applied, there was not a lot of healing happening until we did start applying the TuffRock. I was giving Prestige 20mls of TuffRock Conditioner Plus daily in feed. The wound was washed and the poultice was applied daily.
